May 18th was Village Day at the Capitol!

Representatives from Bay-Area Villages spent a day in the Capitol spreading the word about Villages and their positive impact on communities.

Representatives from Bay-Area Villages walked the halls of the Capitol visiting 20 legislators and staff, sharing information about the value of Villages as a piece of the Long-Term Care continuum. We were acknowledged from the floor of the Assembly by Assemblymember Chiu, and introduced on the Senate Floor by Senator Scott Wiener. For the majority of legislators, this was the first time they have heard of Villages and the work we do. We also received a welcome and words of guidance from long-time supporter, Assemblymember Chiu about how to proceed in a legislative arena, and how to build momentum for possible future funding from the legislature.

**The Presidio Officers' Club Museum Special Exhibit:
Exclusion – 75th Anniversary of the Japanese American
incarceration order.**

Wednesday, June 21, 10:30-1:00.

**(We'll see the exhibit and then stop in to the café in the building
for a post-exhibit beverage and conversation.)**

During World War II, the Presidio of San Francisco – the Army's Western Defense Command – played a pivotal role in the unjust incarceration of 120,000 Japanese Americans, purportedly in the name of national security. This special exhibition marks 75 years since Lieutenant General John L. DeWitt issued Civilian Exclusion Orders from the Presidio, and examines the post's little understood part in these events.

The exhibition invites visitors to investigate the choices – both personal and political – that led to this dark chapter in American history. How did leaders arrive at this decision? How did Japanese Americans respond to the violation of their civil liberties? And what, as a nation, have we learned that can help us address the present-day issues of immigration, racism, and mass incarceration?

Exclusion is the latest special exhibition at the Presidio Officers' Club, a cultural institution showcasing the Presidio's role in shaping and serving the nation. Special exhibitions explore the Presidio's heritage and allow for fresh perspectives and a deeper exploration of the topics and themes presented in the club's permanent exhibition. <http://www.presidio.gov/>

Coffee and Cigarettes — US Jim Jarmusch, 2003. 97 min.


More than ten years after Jarmusch made *Night on Earth* (Salon 12/13/16), he put together another compilation of short pieces, this time tied together by the theme of coffee and cigarettes. Sometimes just a few cigarettes, sometimes a lot; sometimes so much coffee that the drinker's hand shakes; sometimes-herbal tea. We get Jarmusch regulars like Roberto Benigni offering to help an acquaintance, Steven Wright, with a dreaded dental appointment, and Tom Waits and Iggy Pop in a subtle duel of male egos. Renée French, with a disintegrating beehive do, just wants to read her gun catalogue quietly while she has a cup of joe and a cigarette, but her waiter won't leave her in peace. Cate Blanchett does double duty in a meeting with her seldom seen cousin, and Alfred Molina and Steve Coogan do a wincingly awkward Hollywood dance around the subject of a distant familial connection.

In addition to their common subject, most episodes are also linked by one shot from directly over the table where coffee and cigarettes are arrayed, sometimes fighting it out for space. Some of the episodes like Molina's and Coogan's are deliciously subtle. Others, like the one between brothers, Joe Rigano and Vinny Vella, and twins Joie Lee and Cinqué Lee, will make you think a bit about your own family and where you grew up, especially if it was on the other coast. Jarmusch's script, sly and blunt, funny and sad, is aided enormously by the black and white film and its superb use by a quartet of fine cinematographers that includes Robby Müller, who shot *Alice in the Cities* (Salon, 9/16).



This month, I want to thank Supervisor Aaron Peskin and his staff: Beth Rubenstein and Sunny Angulo, for helping us with a challenging demand we faced from the Department of Aging.

NEXT Village is proud of our ability to offer subsidized memberships, and the City wanted us to force every member to pay at least \$120 per year. Besides being a hardship for many people, it would have turned us into bill collectors, and put us in a tough spot if a membership had lapsed and the member needed support from us.

Supervisor Peskin and his crack staff took the time to listen to our concerns and then swung into action, as did Assemblymember David Chiu. Their effort helped us reach key decision makers in the aging department who agreed to pull that request back for now, giving us an opportunity to have a policy conversation about this and a few other issues.
